Superlative degree: Sofia is the happiest of all.



Hans Christian Andersen was a man who simply would not give up. He was born in 1805 in Odense in Denmark. His family was very poor. There was only one room in their house. Hans did not do well in school and some of the other children bullied him. When he was 14 years old, he went to Copenhagen to seek his fortune

In Copenhagen, Hans tried singing, dancing and acting. He also wrote poems and plays. However, his efforts were not a success.

Hans would not give up. He went back to school.

Atter six long and difficult years, he managed to pass all of his exams. However, people still would not read his books and plays. Everybody said, 'Give up, Hans. Find a proper job!'

Hans did not listen to them. One day, he started writing stories for children. Suddenly, he was a success. Everyone loved his fairy tales.

Hans published 156 fairy tales altogether. His most famous fairy tales are *The Little Mermaid*, *The Ugly Duckling*, *The Emperor's New Clothes* and *The Snow Queen*.

Hans became a rich man. He travelled all over Europe, staying with kings and queens. His own life was a fairy tale come true. When he died in 1875, the bells in Copenhagen were rung for him.






