Yuri Gagarin

he first person in history to fly into space on a rocket was Yuri Gagarin. He was a brave pilot from Russia. Yuri was born in 1934 and grew up on a collective farm in Russia. One of his teachers was a pilot during the Second World War. Perhaps that is why Yuri wanted to become a pilot.

Yuri joined the air force in 1955 and trained to be a jet pilot. He quickly showed that he had great skill. When the Russians decided to send a man into space, they considered a group of pilots for the job. Yuri was in this group and passed lots of tests. He was not a very tall man. That may have been one reason why he was picked to fly in a tiny spacecraft called *Vostok 1*. Yuri trained very hard to prepare for the flight.

On the 12th of April 1961, *Vostok 1* blasted off into space. It was a very dangerous mission. Thankfully, Yuri got back to Earth safely. While he was in space, he looked out the window of his spacecraft. He was the of first person ever to see our home planet from space. 'The Earth is blue. How wonderful! It is amazing,'

he said through his radio back to Earth.

Yuri was very famous when he got back to Earth. Lots of people all over the world wanted to meet him. He visited lots of countries to talk about his flight. Sadly, in 1968, he was killed in a plane crash. The whole world was sorry to lose such a hero.

Art

This week, in Art, we will be looking at making PRINTS. A print is made by pressing your card down onto something and what you are left with is a print. For this lesson you will need just 4 things.:

- Shaving foam
- Paper plate
- Food colouring (2 or 3 colours)
- A stick / chopstick (teaspoon handle will do)
- White card (Postcard size)
- More card to scrape off excess foam

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Firstly squirt the shaving foam onto the plate.
- 2. Then drip the food colouring on top of the shaving foam. Use 6-7 drops of each colour spread the drops out.
- 3. Then drag the back of the spoon up and down and across the shaving foam to mix the colours.
- 4. Carefully place your white card onto the shaving foam. Leave for 5-10 seconds
- 5. Lift the card up and wipe away the shaving foam.
- 6. ... And There's your beautiful print!

You can use the shaving foam again to make more prints.

I would recommend that you only use 2 colours frist - Make a print Add in a third colour then to make more prints with different colours

Dublin Zoo

Dublin Zoo is one of the oldest zoos in the world. It is located in the Phoenix Park. It first opened in September 1831. It has changed a lot since then.

When it opened, the zoo had a lot of animals in small cages. They did not have much room to move about. The animals were not very happy. Over the years, the zoo keepers have learned a lot about how to care for animals. Today, Dublin Zoo is an excellent zoo and the animals are well cared for and happy. The animals live in large spaces. These are more like their homes in the wild.

One of the large spaces in the zoo is the African Plains area. African animals such as zebra are free to wander around this plain as they like. There is also a special forest trail for the elephants. Many of the monkeys live on their own special island in the lake.

Dublin Zoo looks after some very rare animals. It is home to rare fruit bats and Golden Lion Tamarins from South America. Without the work of the zoo, these animals could become **extinct**. This means that there would be none of them left in the world. Sometimes,

the zoo swaps animals with other zoos. Then more rare animals can be bred. Lots of baby gorillas, chimpanzees and hippopotamuses have been born in the zoo.
